OCTOBER QUARTERLY PROGRAM REVIEW

We were pleased to have Todd Graham, Principal Forecaster for the Met Council who presented the **Demographic Trends in Greater Minnesota and the Metro Area**. Several dozen League members were in attendance via Zoom and, as usual, asked great questions.

Graham gave a mini-seminar in "forecasting through models"- how it works, and how it changes. He followed up with **Highlights of Current Forecasts in Greater MN and the Metro Area**. This showed how forecasting population, households and jobs informs state, metro, local and business leaders so that they can plan and respond to expected changes.

Graham explained that there are three models used by Met Council: regional economic, land, and travel demand. The Met Council contracts with REMI-PI as its model. Graham emphasized that models are not crystal balls - but projections built upon historical data. That means if something dramatically different occurs than in the past, forecasts will show the change.

Such different occurrences include pandemics (excess death rates), low birth rates, migration patterns and changes in economic competitiveness. For example, a precipitous decline in green cards/naturalizations will affect the size of the workforce available to employers.

What does modeling show? Modeling shows slowing population growth in the Metro Area and more steady growth in greater Minnesota. It also shows growing diversity in both areas. These trends mirror national trends. While 70% of job growth is in the Metro Area, population, household and employment trends in Greater Minnesota follow similar patterns.

The greatest growth in Metro Area households is in the 65+ households, followed by households under 65 with 3+ persons - but the latter group is not growing as fast as it had in prior years. Population trends affect the nature of housing demand and economic growth. Slow growth over the past 20 years in the working-age population has been a drag on business, holding employers back. The growth in population 65+ leads to increased housing demand that meets their needs though there also is a lot of "aging in place."

Mr. Graham told me that our questions about demand for senior housing had not come up in other venues and gave him some something to consider going forward.

The foreign-born workforce is growing faster than the U.S. born workforce. International immigrants are an important component of the workforce growth, but climate refugees are not, as they tend not to move too far from home - they just move inland, therefore Minnesota should not expect a lot of immigration from hurricane zones
