CMAL WILL PRESENT TO THE METRO MN WATERSHEDS - APRIL 15

CMAL will present information about our Watershed Study to Metro Minnesota Watersheds, a chapter of Minnesota Watersheds, a non-profit for local government entities in Minnesota that manage watersheds.

The Metro Watersheds chapter meets quarterly to share ideas on watershed management policy and practice, and to hear from Minnesota State agencies and regulators about developments in water management. All MN Watersheds report directly to the MN Board of Soil and Water.

On April 15 at 7:00 p.m., CMAL will make a short presentation about our Watershed Study. The audience will include metro watershed administrators, staff from the metro area, and metro and state entities with watershed management regulatory authority. This is an excellent opportunity to promote our study and thank those who have already met with League members.

OCTOBER QUARTERLY PROGRAM REVIEW

CMAL was pleased to host Patricia Nauman, Executive Director of Metro Cities, at a well-attended Zoom meeting on January 29, 2025.

Nauman has served since 2009 as Executive Director of Metro Cities, a membership organization that advocates on behalf of its members at all state levels. Nauman has spoken at previous CMAL events and also provided an interview during the course of CMAL's 2018-2019 study on Metropolitan Council governance. She described decision-making at the Metro Cities board as collaborative, with member cities typically aligned on issues such as (1) funding for metro area cities, (2) tools available for cities' use, and (3) municipal autonomy.

Nauman stated that Metro Cities monitors the thousands of bills introduced annually and informs member cities about legislative developments.

Housing regulation has been a hot topic at the Legislature for the past two sessions. There have been efforts to shift zoning regulations from local cities and municipalities to state responsibility. Metro Cities is opposed to such regulations and prefers local/citizen-led zoning appropriate to their areas. Cities seek assistance from the legislature rather than state control.

In dialogue with the audience, Nauman reiterated metropolitan cities' desire for local autonomy concerning housing and density, emphasizing that cities cannot mandate the development of affordable housing even if they zone for it.

Regarding Metropolitan Council governance, Metro Cities supports the appointment of Metropolitan Council members, who are not local elected officials, by the Governor to staggered terms, aligning with CMAL's

position. According to Nauman, the cities in the metro area are the primary constituents of the Metropolitan Council, hence their focus on the Council's policies, such as those proposed regarding housing density.

CMAL WATERSHED STUDY UPDATE

Hey League Members, do not despair if you are still working on your area's Watershed Study!

We realize that "life happens" for all of us, but we encourage you to continue working on them. At present, half of the 33 studies have been submitted, and the data provided has proven to be highly insightful.

It has been reported that most watershed districts have responded positively to the study and appreciated our effort to highlight their work. The two-step process initiated has proven beneficial in gathering information, and meetings with the watershed districts have effectively facilitated information sharing.

At the watershed study check-in meetings, we gathered excellent suggestions for the Final Report. We will use these ideas as we prepare the report this summer. The Final Report will be shared with League members, the public, and local watershed officials.

TODD GRAHAM MAKES THE NEWS

CMAL hosted Todd Graham, Principal Forecaster for the Metropolitan Council, at its October 2024 Quarterly meeting. Graham shared his forecasts for population, households, and jobs in the metro area, which was summarized in the CMAL 2024 Newsletter.

Graham was recently featured in a Minnesota Star Tribune article on February 12, 2025 providing updated population trends in the metro area. The Met Council does this forecast every 10 years which covers years 2020-2050. His predictions include:

- Minneapolis might reach a population of 500,000 and St. Paul 338,200
- Cities like Eden Prairie, Lakeville, Blaine, Maple Grove, Woodbury will see large increases
- Carver is growing due to the completion of HW 212 in the southwestern metro
- Mound, Mahtomedi, Bayport, Lakeland, Coates, and Vermillion are not expected to increase due to lack of land or wastewater capacity or restrictions meant to preserve farmland or natural areas.

SALT APPLICATOR, LIMITED LIABILITY BILL HF793, SF492

Chloride (salt) pollution is a growing problem in Minnesota. It is affecting our streams, ponds, lakes, and rivers.

There are several contributors to this problem: de-icing salts on streets and highways that flow into waterways, oversalting commercial and public walkways due to fear of lawsuits if someone falls, home water softeners, industrial wastewater and agricultural runoff.

2025 Legislation

One bill, SF 492 and HF 793, aims to reduce chloride pollution by creating a voluntary certification program for water-friendly salt applicators trained in best practices. The bill also limits liability if certified applicators use de-icing agents correctly and keep records unless negligence is clearly evident.

In our CMAL Watershed Study interview with Laura Jester, Executive Director of Bassett Creek WMO, noted that private businesses tend to oversalt walkways due to the fear of liability lawsuits. Highways and roads are the biggest polluters in the metro area.

This bill will not end chloride pollution, but it would reduce it. Ask your MN Representative and MN senator to support this bill. HF 793
